## **WELCOME AND ANNOUNCEMENTS**

Bishop Wright announced that the 227th and 228th conventions would also be held at the Sheraton, Dover and introduced members of the host parishes, St. Paul's, Camden and St. Mary's, Bridgeville. Elaine Muhlbauer, Sr. Warden of St. Mary's, gave a brief history of St. Mary's and details of their ministries/outreach programs. ## REPORT OF NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Maureen Lyons, Chair of the Nominating Committee and a member of Trinity Parish in Wilmington, was recognized to give the Report of the Nominating Committee. She directed everyone's attention to the "Offices to Be Filled" document complete with photographs and biographies of those running for election. The Chair named the offices and asked for nominations from the floor. Offices to be filled included Trustees, Disciplinary Board, Standing Committee, Constitution & Canons, Diocesan Council, and General Convention Deputies.

The Chair asked The Rev. Canon Carl Kunz, Jr., Chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons to report canonical changes voted at last year's convention. The Rev. Teri also spoke briefly of the services projects taking place to raise money to fight world hunger and directed Convention attendees to stop by the Prayer Stations the youths created.

## **LUNCH**

### **BISHOP'S REPORT**

- Emerging Theme: Young Leadership Development is essential. Diocese of Delaware is a great place for young to grow into leadership but can be better. Need to keep this goal and stewardship of most precious resource;
- Ministry of Diocesan Schools. Camp Arrowhead;
- Financially doing well. Able to meet all commitments with money for new ventures;

Mission Study four (4) years ago – recession made Diocese very cautious; Diocese has always been a source of stability and strength; ready and in position to refocus on priorities:

- 2010 Bishop's Mission Fund supported Episcopal Youth Event (EYE);
- Camp Arrowhead: 2010 enrollment was up (higher than 2006); supported by parishes and scholarships; facilities need to be expanded/upgraded; looking to be fully accredited by The American Camping Association this summer;
- Development of opportunities for leadership, training, and fellowship. Deacons Program very successful. Jesse Ball DuPont Fund has given a seed grant to begin planning how to meet that need;
- Mission is worldwide – looking for new companion relationship; committee has been formed and will begin to identify another relationship with a diocese in another part of the world;
- Presiding Bishop has asked all dioceses to help rebuild The Episcopal Church in Haiti; there are over 50,000 Episcopalians in the Diocese of Haiti, over 80 parishes, schools, and clinics. 2011 Bishop's Mission Fund will be designated to this rebuilding and the Diocesan Council will match first \$7500 contributed.
- Challenges facing The Cathedral of St. John: difficult to support day-to-day costs of ministry and upkeep of facilities and grounds. A series of studies have been conducted over the past year to develop alternative sources of funding or other uses for facilities. Vestry has requested financial support from Council. Letters will be written to all parishes sharing additional information and asking for input.
- At the next General Assembly, a bill will be put forth asking the state to authorize civil unions. Introduction of this bill might become an opportunity to revive theological conflicts between churches and individuals. Episcopal Church believes that “all have a seat at table together”. Go to legislators and ask them “to do the right thing”. Bill is not about where you stand theologically but about giving fundamental rights to couples to build stronger communities.
- “God has given us another good year; let us use it well.” – Bishop Alfred Lee

## **REPORT OF YOUTH COUNCIL**

The Chair recognized Teri Valente, Youth Ministry Coordinator. Teri discussed the 30-hour famine and Happening, an intentional retreat for students to seek what it is to have a relationship with Jesus. Eight (8) students have been sent to Happening. Diocese of Delaware is a member of Province III, which encompasses W. Virginia, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Washington, D.C., Maryland, and Delaware. Teri reviewed Wintercamp, and E.Y.E., the 2<sup>nd</sup> largest gathering of Episcopal students held every three (3) years. The Diocese is looking to send twenty-six (26) students to E.Y.E. in June 2011.

## **DIACONATE PROJECT PRESENTATION**

Deacon Dottie Vuono reviewed the Diaconate Project of collecting funds for Wells For Hope that began in June 2010. The Wells For Hope campaign has collected over \$6,000, enough to build one well. Visit the ERD website to donate.

## **REPORT OF THE TREASURER**

The Chair recognized Walt Cheatham, Treasurer. Walt introduced the members of the Council Finance Committee. The budget process was reviewed. **A Motion was presented and APPROVED** to accept the 2010 Unaudited Budget. The 2011 Working Budget adopted by Council was presented as an informational update. A question regarding the Campus Ministry Support was brought by The Rev. Mark Harris with regard to the support of Campus Ministry going from full-time to part-time staff. Bishop Wright stated that a long-term plan to build and strengthen that ministry had been tapered down but is now being renewed and is strengthening. Walt then presented the 2012 Planning Budget. Acceptances should remain level; plan for reduction in Trustee support; anticipating a balanced budget; ability to maintain prior commitments (Camp Arrowhead / Fairshare Pledge/Youth Ministry/Church Growth) to accept the 2012 Planning Budget

**Bishop's Address**  
**Dover Sheraton Convention Center**  
**Saturday, February 28, 2011**

As we gather for the 226<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention of our diocese, I would like to share with you a few remarks from my perspective as Bishop. Thank you for your good spirit and for your support through the years and especially over this last year. The uncertainties and economic challenges we have faced as a nation, as communities, and as families make us all realize how essential such blessing can be. Thanks for your Good Spirit and your Generous Support.

From Selbyville and Delmar to Claymont and Newark to Dover, Smyrna, and Wilmington we are doing well. The Sunday parish visits that I enjoy so much, recent Parish Lay Leadership conferences, the Winter Priests retreat, and Deacon's meetings all confirm this positive sense.

Your generosity is a sign of all this – and because of your support, we, as a diocese, will be able to meet our commitments and present a balanced budget to this convention. This is impressive, and compared to other dioceses maybe even exceptional. Thank you!

Four years ago we put the finishing touches on a Diocesan Mission Study. Changes in the economy made it necessary to wait before moving ahead with aspects of the study. Our diocese first and foremost is a source of stability and strength for the Episcopal Church in Delaware. We do not want to jeopardize this long tradition. Today we are in the position of re-focusing our attention on the opportunities for mission outlined in the Diocesan Mission Study.

*The First Priority is Ministry to Our Young People.* Thanks to Teri Valente and the Diocesan Youth Council for the work they are doing and for the congregations that are making ministry to young people a priority. Many of our young people are here today participating in the 30 Hour Famine. If you haven't invited Teri to visit your congregation or encouraged your young people to attend diocesan and regional youth events – I hope you will do so. This coming summer youth from around our church will attend the national Episcopal Youth Event. We anticipate that the largest delegation ever from Delaware will attend. Your support of the 2010 Bishop's Mission Fund helped make this possible. Thank you.

*A Second Priority is Camp Arrowhead* Few dioceses are blessed with such a beautiful and wonderful resource for ministry to children and families. When the recession began we were concerned about how it might impact our camp. In fact, during 2010 attendance at camp and support for camp was up. Thank you for sending your young people to Camp Arrowhead. Thank you for the scholarships you provide to make Camp Arrowhead affordable for every family.

This coming summer we will take important steps toward seeking full accreditation of our program by the American Camping Association. This assurance of best practices is important to all of us. At the same time a sub-committee of the Diocesan Council is beginning to develop a plan to tackle needed capital improvements to Camp Arrowhead. Stay tuned. We will need your support to make these plans a reality.

*The Third Priority is developing opportunities for training and fellowship for our parish lay*

*leaders and lay ministers.* Six years ago we began a program to recruit and train deacons to serve here in Delaware. The success of that program makes me hopeful as we pursue this new opportunity. I am happy to report that the “Jessie Ball DuPont Fund” has given us a seed grant to begin planning this project. You will be hearing more about this in the coming year.

Our diocesan mission is not limited to the boundaries of Delaware. At our last Annual Convention we welcomed Bishop Martin Shaw and his wife, Elspeth, from the Diocese of Argyll and The Isles in Scotland. We thanked the Shaws and our many friends in the Scottish Episcopal Church for the many blessings of our Companion Relationship over the last eight years. With that relationship now concluded, we turn toward future possibilities. Next month a committee of the Diocesan Council will begin to explore a new companion relationship. That committee hopes to report on their work at our next Annual Convention.

We all know that one year ago Haiti was rocked by a devastating earthquake. Many do not realize the important role that the Episcopal Church plays in Haiti. The Episcopal Diocese of Haiti has over 50,000 members, 80 parishes, schools, clinics, and associated ministries. The impact of the earthquake on so many good things has been very severe. Our Presiding Bishop has asked every diocese in the Episcopal Church to help the Diocese of Haiti rebuild. With the support of our own Diocesan Council I am happy to tell you this year’s Bishop’s Mission Fund will be dedicated to this good cause. Every dollar contributed to the 2011 Bishop’s Fund will go toward rebuilding the Episcopal Church in Haiti. To make this opportunity even better the Diocesan Council has voted to match the first \$7,500 raised this year. Later this spring you will be asked to contribute. I hope you will consider a generous gift.

I also want to talk with you about a challenge facing one of our congregations. Over the last years the Cathedral Church of St. John’s has found it increasingly difficult to support the day-to-day cost of ministry and the upkeep of a large facility and grounds. This problem is not unique to the Cathedral, to Wilmington, or to the Episcopal Church. It is phenomenon experienced by many mainline congregations – especially in urban areas. In other places such problems have been ignored leading to a crisis that no one wants to face. We do not want that to happen here in Delaware.

So, over the last year the diocese and the Cathedral leadership have collaborated in a series of studies with the hope of developing alternative sources of funding and other possible uses for the facilities. I admire the hard work and faithfulness of the congregation, appreciate the pastoral leadership of interim Dean, Bill Lane, and other clergy who have served the congregation. This process has required much patience and good will on all sides.

Late last year the Cathedral Vestry concluded that the best path forward would be to request financial support from the Diocesan Council to sustain and develop the Cathedral’s ministry over the next years. The Council received the request and has met with the Cathedral leadership several times.

This is a significant matter. It touches upon the historic commitment of our church to the ministry in the City of Wilmington – the largest city in our state. It causes us to ask what might be the role and ministry of a cathedral in our diocese. It raises questions about how we could fund such a project.

Because this is a significant matter I promised the Diocesan Council that I would talk with you about it here at Convention. And, in a few weeks on behalf of the Council I will be

writing every vestry in the diocese. In my letter I will be sharing more information and asking for your thoughts and input. The Council and I both believe that we will make a better decision when we have heard from you. Thank you for your involvement and support.

Finally, I want to speak to you more as a citizen of the State of Delaware than as a Bishop. Later this year a bill to authorize civil unions between couples of the same gender will be introduced in the General Assembly. I am concerned that the public debate surrounding this bill will become a source of heated theological debate, disagreements, and even conflict between religious groups in our state. I hope this doesn't happen.

We know from our experience in the Episcopal Church that the theological conversations about gender, identity, and relationships have been going on for a long time. There continue to be significant differences and agreements about these matters among people of good faith. In the Episcopal Church there is room for everyone at the table even for those who disagree. The source of our unity is found in our love for Christ.

The public debate about civil unions has a different character. It is about fundamental human rights. It is about the rights of children and families. It is about basic things like caring for a sick partner or sharing an inheritance from one generation to the next. A civil union law makes certain that all couples have the rights that most couples take for granted. Our long experience in America teaches us that when fundamental human rights are extended and strengthened we grow as a nation and as a people. This is our goal.

Now every year I have ended my Convention Address with the same phrase "God has given us another good year, let us use it well." These words are not mine. They were actually first used by Bishop Alfred Lee – our first bishop. It was the way he ended his Convention addresses many years ago. Since that time much has happened and so much has changed. But, what he said then is still true today. We have been given another good year – haven't we? In so many ways this is, as Brian McLaren said, an Episcopal Moment, the Episcopal Moment. Not so much because of anything we have done or are doing, but because of Jesus, the Risen Christ living among us in the power of the Holy Spirit. We are surrounded by blessings and opportunities – the fruit of God's graciousness – a field ripe for the harvest. Now as Jesus' disciples having been given so many good things, we ask the disciples' question. How will we use them? "God has given us another good year, let us use it well."

## DIOCESAN ORGANIZATIONS

### ANAMCHARA FELLOWSHIP

**The Purpose:** The members of The Anamchara Fellowship commit to pursue a consecrated life, lived either together in community or singly, yet bound by a common ideal. The Anamchara Fellowship will seek to teach the faith of Christ by whatever means are at its disposal, and to promote the ministries of teaching, spiritual direction and pastoral care.

**The Dedication:** We are dedicated to the Holy Trinity, who exemplifies the Anamchara relationship.

**The Spirit:** The Anamchara Fellowship is lived in the spirit of Celtic Christianity, by a focus on the crucified and risen Christ. This leads to inclusiveness (seeking to build bridges), generosity, gentleness toward all that God has created, with a sense of being in harmony with all of God's creation and to have a heart for pilgrimage.

Established in 2003, by Sisters Barbara Jean Brown and Julian Wilson, the Fellowship received canonical recognition from the House of Bishops at their meeting in March 2008. The Fellowship is made up of Professed Members, Novices, Aspirants and Companions from 12 different Dioceses. The "Mother House" is located in Newark, DE, and many of the current Fellowship reside in Delaware. We currently have 20 members (made up of professed, novices and aspirants) and 10 companions. We are a participating member of NAECC (National Association of Episcopal Christian Communities). Two members of the Fellowship represented us at the Province 3 Synod this year.

Within the Diocese of Delaware, the Fellowship is represented in several parishes: St. Barnabas, St. James Millcreek, Ascension, Christ Church Christiana Hundred, Immanuel Highlands and St. Thomas. One Professed member of the Fellowship serves on the Standing Committee, One Professed member was ordained to the Vocational Diaconate on December 5, 2009. Another Professed member of the Fellowship works as the Trauma Chaplain at Christiana Hospital and does extensive teaching on related issues to hospital staff, doctors and nurses, as well as facilitating a cancer support group.

Each member and Companion of the Fellowship is encouraged to offer themselves to the ministries of pastoral care, catechesis or spiritual direction where they live; to be present to and participate as fully as they can in the life of their own parishes. The Local membership (from Delaware and New Jersey) come together once a month for common prayer, fellowship and study. We are always seeking some service projects to participate in, either individually or as a group, as the opportunities arise, and we are available to parishes and dioceses for any pastoral or teaching opportunities that may be asked of us.

## CAMP AND CONFERENCE CENTERS

### **Arrowhead Camp and Conference Center**

Camp Arrowhead had another successful summer camping season with attendance up 50 from 2009, despite the economic situation. Approximately 889 campers attended the residential and day camp this past summer. Among these were 175 Episcopal children from the Diocese of Delaware and 54 from the Diocese of Pennsylvania. The summer camp staff led by Walt Lafontaine is to be commended for their leadership through another great summer. Camp is a powerful ministry for youth throughout our Diocese. Registration for the 2011 summer season is already underway so please encourage the young people of our parishes to take advantage of the treasure that is Camp Arrowhead.

Camp Arrowhead is also utilized as a conference center during the balance of the year. Groups enjoy the rustic setting to spend time building relationships, enjoying the outdoors or learning about nature in the unique setting on the edge of the tidal marsh. Many of the groups utilize the programs of the Carmine Environmental Center (CEC) to gain hands on knowledge of a coastal environment. Over 30 groups spent time at Camp Arrowhead for a conference or environmental seminar. A cross section of the groups attending included: schools, churches, youth groups, and outdoor enthusiasts. We also hosted several weddings of former campers or staff. This is a ministry with room to expand particularly in the area of environmental education.

A Study Group commissioned by Diocesan Council has been looking at the overall camp program. The group includes members of Diocesan Council, several other persons interested in the future of camp and a representative of the staff Alumni Association. The Group will be making a report on its recommendations for Camp's future during 2011.

Negotiations with the State of Delaware on several land issues resumed in 2010.

### **duPont Memorial House**

Memorial House completed another successful year as the overnight retreat center for

the Diocese. We are also benefiting from a number of groups using Memorial House for family reunions or group retreats during holiday seasons. With its picturesque setting in Rehoboth Beach this gift from the A. Felix duPont family remains one of the jewels of our life together in Delaware. The house provides an ideal place for vestry retreats, group meetings and summer vacation fellowship for the clergy and members of the Diocese. The conference season from September to mid-June is booked on most weekends and weekday use is increasing. The majority of the groups are church affiliated with a significant number coming from Delaware. We are targeting additional non-profit usage during the week as a goal in the future. The summer season continues to be a popular way for individuals, families and parish groups to enjoy fellowship with members of our Diocesan clergy and their families.

### **CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB**

The Church Periodical started as a club in 1888 by Mary Ann Drake Fargo and a small group of Episcopal Women. Their desire was to get books and bibles to the missionaries in the Dakotas and further West. I hope you noticed Mary Ann's last name Fargo. She persuaded her husband to put the supplies on Wells Fargo stage coaches. Our delivery system has changed but not the commitment to supply theological and educational materials to missionaries all around the world.

CPC is an independent affiliated organization of the Episcopal Church. We depend solely on voluntary contributions to carry out this ministry. Like the church, CPC functions at all levels: parish, diocesan, provincial and national. Parish and diocesan representatives initiate local projects. Through the national granting programs grants are allocated worldwide based on contributions available in two funds. Applications for these are processed through the CPC offices at the Episcopal Church Center in New York.

Last year in Anaheim, California on July 6, 2009 during the CPC Triennial Meeting 78 grants were funded for a total of \$33,498.22 for domestic and overseas projects. The other fund that distributed grants is the Miles of Pennies were 18 grants totaling \$13,600.90.

Last year the Diocese of Delaware contributed \$286.37 to the Church Periodical Club for the Miles of Pennies. So far this year the total collected is \$322.28. In St. John the Baptist Church in Milton we have a jar at the doorway where people drop in their pennies and of course after church the children carry the jar around in Fellowship Hall. This fund is for children – preschool through grades 12. It provides printed or taped books and related materials just for them. A plaque was received for the Diocese of Delaware in appreciation for contributing 2 Miles of Pennies over the last few years. Thank you all for your support.

### **COMMITTEE ON THE ADVANCE AND DEVELOPMENT FUNDS**

The available invested cash balance in the Advance Fund (loans) at December 31, 2010 and 2009, was \$755,947 and \$749,620, respectively. The loan repayments during 2010 were \$237,813. As of December 31, 2010, outstanding loans and other receivables totaled \$928,476. Loan disbursements during 2010 totaled \$237,813 as follows:

- Calvary, Hillcrest \$ 54,225
- Christ Church, Delaware City \$133,000
- St. John the Baptist \$ 410
- St. Anne's, Middletown \$ 25,772
- St. Paul's. Georgetown \$ 24,406

The available invested cash balance in the Development Fund (grants) at December 31, 2010 and 2009 was \$720,788 and \$759,023, respectively. In 2010, there were four challenge grants were issued. St. Philip's, Laurel received \$15,305, Calvary, Hillcrest received \$15,000, Christ Church, Delaware City received \$45,000, and St. Paul's, Georgetown received \$9,054. There was one cash grant issued to St. Martin's, Selbyville for \$5,500.

Loan interest of \$22,675 was paid during 2010 along with investment interest and quarterly Master Fund A distributions of \$73,395. At December 31, 2010, there was \$11,207 in accrued interest outstanding.

During 1994, the Diocesan Council had transferred the final RL-70's reserves to the Advance and Development Funds. The Committee on the A & D Funds has continued the practice of transferring the interest from this \$166,000 to the Bishop and Council. The amount of interest transferred in 2010 was \$11,000. Advance and Development Funds assets (cash, receivables, and investments) totaled \$2,416,913 on December 31, 2010 including \$3,476 in interest reserved for the Bishop and Council.

Communications and Press Liaison for the diocese, helping to spread the word about what Delaware Episcopalians are doing at the diocesan and parish levels.

The *Net* is published each Wednesday, and submissions may be sent to Courtney Gardner at [cgardner@dioceseofdelaware.net](mailto:cgardner@dioceseofdelaware.net) The e-newsletter is sent to staff members and parish leaders around the diocese. It includes a weekly message from Bishop Wright and provides a perfect vehicle to get the word out about time-sensitive events as well as advertising for lay staff positions.

Danny Schweers (who is an active member at the Episcopal Church of Saints Andrew and Matthew, Wilmington) continues to work eight hours a week for the diocese, maintaining the diocesan website. Visits to the website continue to increase, with 31,813 visits in October, 2010 compared to 24,359 visits in December, 2009, and 8,670 visits in December, 2007. Also, in the past year Danny designed ten issues of the *Delaware Communion* newspaper, with additional articles appearing on the Publications page of the website. Back issues of the *Communion*, as well as scores of other documents and photos, can be found on the diocesan website at [www.DioceseofDelaware.net](http://www.DioceseofDelaware.net)

The *Delaware Communion* was published jointly with *Episcopal News Monthly* in 2010, sharing news from the diocese, the United States, and the Anglican Communion with parishioners in Delaware from September through June. Jen Mason, *Communion* editor, focuses coverage on key events and milestones in the lives of Delaware parishes and ministry partners, in addition to diocesan news and events. Jen is a member of St. Peter's, Lewes, and works seven hours a week for the diocese. Volunteers are key to the life of the paper, as all writing and proofreading services are donated. In addition to the many generous writers, the *Communion* is proofread each month by members of the bishop's staff and Anthony Grillo, Immanuel Highlands; Helen Murphy, St. Peter's, Lewes; Barb Scira, St. Nicholas; and Diane Sparks, Christ Church Christiana Hundred. #### **EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY (EfM)**

### **EPISCOPAL CAMPUS MINISTRY**

Two of the incoming students participated in Deacon Tom McCormick's ministry, "Workforce at Camp Arrowhead, where we helped build a ramp. We are looking forward to more students participating next summer in this important and meaningful ministry.

This year PHELT, Province Higher Education Leadership Team, met very early in the semester (2nd week of September). Turnout was very poor with only four chaplaincies represented. We are considering changing the time to the second semester.

This October the students had their first Halloween party for the parish children, it was a great success, and everyone is geared up to make this an annual event.

The students are involved with several other ministry projects. We are again involved with the African Team/Ministries selling jewelry and artifacts. Proceeds from the sale are used to support orphaned children in Kenya whose parents have died from AIDS. We are able to keep 20% of the profits, which will be used for future mission trips. We are attempting to send more than the \$928.00 we sent last year. The students hope to go to South Dakota during spring break to do mission work, with a diocese that we have a relation with. The students also rang the bell for Salvation Army this Christmas and had some of our parish children with them. They also participated in two parish-wide service projects: "Code Purple" and an Instructional Seder. This holiday season three students and I traveled to Estes Park, Colorado to participate in the National Church's biannual retreat entitled "Gather Around the Table: Celebrating God with Us."

**Yoga** Yes, is taught by The Reverend Will Boatwright and is offered twice a week, Monday and Thursday, we hope that it will attract students. Parishioners are very grateful for the opportunity to practice Yoga.

The students have enjoyed meeting other diocesan clergy, and every other week we have Eucharist. We are grateful to those clergy who have come to have dinner with us and celebrate. We are looking forward to the Bishop's annual visit this spring.

### **INSURANCE COMMITTEE**

In last year's report, the Insurance Committee's plans for 2010 for the Medical Insurance program included studying the experience of the participants and of the employing entities with the two plans from the Medical Trust and to research what would be needed to offer a high deductible plan in the future. In the case of the Property/Liability Insurance program, the committee planned to analyze the options available when the Church Insurance policy renewed on July 1, 2010.

Based on an assessment of the property/liability insurance market, the committee chose to negotiate with Church Insurance, the then current carrier, instead of shopping the program more widely. The result was that the Property/Liability Insurance program was renewed with Church Insurance at an overall 2% cost increase. That cost increase is due to an increase in the amount of liability coverage for sexual misconduct. In addition, the Cathedral negotiated to opt out of the blanket program, with its \$155,000,000 shared coverage limit, in favor of a separate policy that will provide more coverage for Fine Arts and for the coverage that would pay to bring a building up to code in the event of a major or complete loss but without the security of the large shared limit.

The committee learned that the experience in the Medical Insurance program of our participants and of the employing entities continued to be positive during 2010. Accordingly, the committee recommended continuing offering those two plans in 2011 with the few minor changes which the Medical Trust was implementing. Both the standard EPO 90 plan, which provides benefits only on an in-network basis, and the optional PPO 90/70 plan, which allows the option of access to "out-of-network" providers in return for modestly higher premiums, will reflect rate increases of 6.5%. Again for 2011, the committee recommended that the premiums for the standard EPO 90 plan be paid 100% by the employing organization. For the PPO 90/70 contributory plan, the committee recommended that the premiums be shared between the employer which would contribute the same dollar amount as for the EPO 90 plan and the employee who would contribute the additional amount needed to reach the premium for this plan.

For the Dental Insurance program, the committee recommended renewal for 2011 with the current carrier, Renaissance Insurance Company, at an 18% rate increase. The participants seem to be happy with the plan. The alternative of moving to the Medical Trust would have resulted in a further 25% increase in cost for lesser benefits.

When the Denominational Health Plan becomes mandatory with the January 1, 2013 renewal, an important impact will be the equalization of benefits for clergy and lay employees. Since control of the growth in premiums will be important for the diocese and the parishes, early consultation among both clergy and lay employees will be important. Members of the Insurance Committee realize that all who are involved in these discussions will need to be sensitive to the trade-offs among cost to the employer, cost to the employees, and benefit adequacy. While the Business Manager has shared the information that she has learned about the high deductible plans offered by the Medical Trust, the Insurance Committee has deferred its research until the changes associated with the federal insurance reform law are known.

For 2011, the Insurance Committee's goals and priorities are to assist the Business Manager to: (1) to study our Medical Insurance experience and make recommendations for 2012; and (2) to continue to review the merits of high deductible medical insurance plans that are available from the Medical Trust.

### **INTERFAITH RESOURCE CENTER**

*Mission Statement: The Interfaith Resource Center strives to encourage and equip faith communities in Delaware and on Maryland's Eastern Shore by providing support and resources, so that all may study the scriptures, share the faith, serve others, promote interfaith understanding and praise God.*

Now celebrating its forty-second year, the Interfaith Resource Center continues to grow its collections through acquisitions and donations, with a collection of nearly 7600 items, over 260 resources new to our collection. Each year we use the money available to us from the William Hawley Clark Fund to purchase a host of ecumenical and interfaith resources, insuring that that area of interest continues to be enriched. Pastors also continue to take advantage of our used book service, by which we accept books and other resources donated by pastors and lay people and assist in offering those resources to new homes.

In the summer of 2010, the IRC completed the transition of our entire library to the Dewey Decimal System. This project was accomplished through the diligence of our volunteer team including Anthony Grillo of Immanuel Church Highlands and Dorothy Cutting of St Albans Church. This also gave us the opportunity cull the collection and eliminate resources that no longer meet the needs of our clientele. The result is a library far easier to use.

The volume of customer-initiated electronic contacts continues to grow steadily. With the help of volunteer Don Hobson of Immanuel Church Highlands and consultant Danny Schweers the website was moved to a new web host that offers far more reliable service. Upon Don's recommendation, we also changed our e-news service provider to Vertical Response and with the help of volunteer Alan Jewett of Concord Presbyterian Church, we have been able to increase the frequency of our e-news publications to monthly. In addition, the Interfaith Resource Center has added a Facebook page, a presence on Twitter and maintained a blog for about six months. The IRC director has also been invited to be a contributor to Building Faith ([www.buildfaith.org](http://www.buildfaith.org)), an online Christian Education community administered by Sharon Pearson of Church Publishing Incorporated.

An upgrade to FIOS provides a far stronger signal for our network and offers the convenience of a robust Wi-Fi connection for training programs hosted at the Center. The IRC hosted its first webinar with Mark Stephenson, author of *Web Empower Your Church*. We look forward to planning more offerings in the future. Our Wi-Fi <sup>33</sup> connection also provides internet to St Albans' office, demonstrating the ongoing cooperative relationship that

we enjoy with our host church.

While much can be accomplished through online services, travel remains an important aspect of the director's responsibilities providing visibility and networking. In 2010, the IRC Director attended 6 Episcopal meetings or events including the Delaware & Easton conventions and Parish Life Day; 8 United Methodist meetings or events, including annual conference; and 4 Presbyterian meetings including the retreat. Due to her personal schedule, the IRC Director reduced the number of art history presentations in 2010 and limited them only to dates in the fall. The IRC also hosted Dr Pat Fosarelli who provided 2 separate workshops on pastoral care issues.

Due to health related issues and other changes in the circumstances of our volunteer base, volunteer hours have been drastically reduced in 2010. Other volunteers not previously mentioned offered regular support hours to the Interfaith Resource Center: Joanne Thiebault (St Paul's UMC), The Rev. Mary Browne (Charlestowne UM Charge) and Geraldine Crock (Concord Presbyterian) and on a less frequent basis, Shirley Parris (Calvary Baptist Church), and the Rev Tom Davis (retired Presbyterian pastor).

The current board includes Sr. Sally Russell, President (Catholic Diocese of Wilmington),, the Rev. Bruce Gillette, Vice-President (Limestone Presbyterian), Deacon Sheila Brigid Sharpe, Treasurer (St Alban's Church) and the Rev. Patti Collett (Wyoming UMC), the Rev Ted Day (Ebenezer UMC), Dr. Adly Gorrafa (Islamic Society of Delaware), The Rev. George Karney (Good Shepherd Episcopal), Shirley Parrish (Calvary Baptist Church), the Rev. Kathie Pownall (First Presbyterian, Chesapeake City), the Rev. John Riley (First Presbyterian, Smyrna), Dr. Henry Schenker (Congregation Beth Emeth), the Rev. Dustin Trowbridge (Trinity Episcopal).

### **INVESTMENT COMMITTEE**

The Investment Committee is charged by the Trustees with oversight responsibility for Master Fund A, the collectively-managed investment pool for Diocesan funds and those of many of its congregations. The fund allows the Diocese and member parishes to pool their investments, thus allowing for the benefits afforded a larger fund. The total value of Master Fund A at the end of 2010 was \$53.1 million.

The Fund is managed in accordance with written guidelines adopted by the Trustees. The provisions set an investment objective of 4% cumulative annual real return over rolling five-year periods, based on total returns, consistent with sound investment practice. The Trustees, through the Investment Committee, employ independent advisors, fund managers, and a fund custodian and account administrator. Hamilton & Company of Princeton, New Jersey provides oversight services. Payden & Rygel of Los Angeles, CA manages fixed-income investments; Steinberg Asset Management, LLC, New York, NY manages the 'value' equities portfolio; Neuberger Berman, LLC (The Capital Group) manages the "income" equities portfolio; and, Dawson Capital Management of Southport, Connecticut, manages the "growth" equities portfolio. This mix of investment styles is a key feature of Master Fund A. SunTrust Bank is the fund custodian and is assisted by the diocesan Business Manager. The total cost of management and administration was approximately 100 basis points (or 1%) in 2010, 80 basis points for management and 20 basis points for administration, custody and independent advice. Fee details are contained in the annual audits included elsewhere in this Diocesan Annual Report. The Investment Committee meets quarterly with the consultant and with managers on a rotating basis to review manager performance external benchmarks and the guidelines.

The total return of Master Fund A in the year ended December 31, 2010, net of fees and

expenses, was 10.3%. This compared with our external benchmarks, which ranged from 12% to 13%. Equity returns were 11.1%; fixed income return was 7.9%. The fixed income manager surpassed the external benchmarks. Equity returns lagged the external benchmarks, consistent with our 2009 decision to shift to more conservative equity management. We continued the maximum allocation of investments in equities permitted under the guidelines. Real return for the five-year period ending December 2010 and net of fees was 2.1%, which is below the objective, 6.1%, and the external benchmarks ranging from 3.6-4.1%.

The Trustees have set the 2011 distribution at \$0.41 per unit per quarter, a 7.8% decrease from the level in 2009. This corresponds to a 4.7% payout based on the three-year moving average unit value for the fund through December 2010. Participants are, however, free to take the distribution as set by the Trustees, reinvest any or all of it in Master Fund A, or to withdraw additional funds in accordance with their own policies and requirements.

Master Fund A operates in much the same fashion as a mutual fund with units that are valued monthly. Participants may now deposit or withdraw funds monthly. Judi Gregory, Business Manager, is available at 302-656-5443 to help with the mechanics of participating in Master Fund A.

Our mission is to manage Master Fund A in a way that enables fund participants to carry out their ministries. Our goal is to meet our investment return target while limiting risk during periods of economic downturn. We welcome questions and comments from current and potential new participants.

### **PILOT CONGREGATION: Learning to Embrace Diversity**

The Pilot Congregation now has a new formal name! The Pilot Congregation: Learning to Embrace Diversity. This new name leaves no doubt about our purpose. The new name was instituted because so many, after over 15 years, still ask 'what is the Pilot Congregation'? Nickname is still Pilot Congregation and our mission is still to work with the Bishop, diocese and parishes in moving toward the elimination of racism in our church and community and continue our own growth and learning about race, racial justice and racism. We are Twelve active members, including clergy and lay persons, women, men, Black, White, and Hispanic (we need youth members) representing six parishes in New Castle County.

The Pilot Congregation is committed to the fulfillment of diversity resolutions we presented and were approved at the 2000 Diocesan Convention, requiring all clergy and lay leaders to participate in training encompassing racism, race relations and related social justice issues. After 10 years this is still needed. We offer a six-hour workshop to all diocese and parish clergy and lay (especially lay leaders). We also offer an evaluation method to all parishes who wish to determine their current status toward becoming an inclusive congregation (transformed and welcoming).

Participation in the annual Episcopal Urban Caucus enables Congregation members to stay in touch with national issues and interact with a diverse group of Episcopalians from all parts of the U. S. who are working on similar issues. One member attended a "Train the Trainer" workshop with other participants from Province III. We had a display/exhibit at the 2010 Parish Life Day including the sale of the book "The Ties That Bind" by Bertice Berry. This book will be used as a discussion tool at an upcoming Diocesan event which will feature a presentation from the book author.

The Pilot Congregation worships in an informal setting, using a liturgy that incorporates newspaper clippings, books, and other contemporary writings centered on race. Together with the appropriate Gospel for the week, these readings stimulate lively discussion as we work through our own journey and experience with racism. Local issues that surface in the News

Journal are frequently discussed and individual and group letters to the editor have been submitted. Time also is set aside for presenting reports and planning future events and business such as the racism awareness training, as we continue to support the Bishop in his efforts regarding racism. This included preparing a resource list to be used by parishes after the 10/30 Service of Repentance for Slavery.

Each Eucharistic meeting includes music, food and conversation. The Congregation meets at the Cathedral Church of St. John on the first Saturday of each month from 9:00AM until 12:00 noon (sometimes not as long). We do not meet during July and August. All are welcome to join us for any meeting or contact us for help with congregational assessments and workshops.

## ST. ANDREW'S SCHOOL OF DELAWARE, INC.

St. Andrew's is a residential, college preparatory school for boys and girls in grades 9 through 12. It was founded in 1929 by A. Felix duPont. From its inception, it has been closely linked with the Diocese of Delaware and has two priests on the faculty who act as Chaplains and full-time teachers in the Religious Studies Department. The Chaplains also undertake a full range of other faculty responsibilities.

In September 2010 the School opened with 290 students, 153 boys and 137 girls. Eighty-seven percent of our students come from the following states: Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Missouri, Montana, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Texas and Virginia. International students from 13 countries account for 38 of the student body.

St. Andrew's continues to be competitive from the point of admissions. St. Andrew's remains appealing because of the strength of its academic program, its intimate community atmosphere, its religious and co-curricular focus and the beauty of its campus.

Admission to St. Andrew's is based on academic ability, character, motivation of the applicant, and the suitability of the School to the needs of the candidate, without regard to race, religious affiliation or financial circumstances. This year 45% of the students receive financial aid, the amount of which is determined by need and demonstrated ability.

Since we no longer ask for information about religious affiliation when enrolling a student, it is not possible to give precise figures. The number of Episcopalians is estimated at one-third of the student body, and the number of Roman Catholics has continued to increase over the past decade. Other denominations and faith groups represented include Hindu, Jewish and Muslim and Unitarian, as well as non-denominational sects such as Mormon and Jehovah's Witness. For the 2010-11 school year, the Diocese licensed 17 student and 7 faculty communion assistants. Numerous students help to coordinate and staff our vestry, acolyte team, sacristans, lectors, as well as serving as ushers for our services.

Since St. Andrew's School is affiliated with the Diocese of Delaware, the Bishop is an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees. The Bishop is also a presence on campus officiating at services to begin our school year as well as to confirm students at the end of the year. Daniel T. Roach, Jr. is the Headmaster of the School. A member of the faculty from 1979 to 1997, Mr. Roach was appointed Headmaster in July 1997.

St. Andrew's continuing commitment to educating students for leadership and a life of service is supported by its efforts to provide and maintain facilities conducive to collaborative work and high standards of excellence. This spring marked the groundbreaking for the new athletic field house, which had been in the planning phases for three years. The first expansion of the School's indoor athletic facilities since it became a coed school in the mid-seventies; the Sippelle Field House is expected to qualify for LEED Gold certification, reinforcing the School's commitment to environmental sustainability. It will house three basketball (or volleyball) courts and a state-of-the art fitness center, along with locker rooms for boys' and girls' teams. The court surface will be 15 feet below ground, greatly reducing the energy needed to maintain appropriate temperatures and conditions for practices and games; a jogging track will run the circumference of the courts at ground level, with lots of glass in the walls and roof for natural illumination throughout. Completion is expected in the summer of 2011.

In addition to its academic year all-residential college preparatory program, the School hosts several residential youth leadership and development programs in the summer months, primarily for undeserved students in the Mid-Atlantic region. Educational and sports-based programs emphasize strong values and ethics, including expectations for both individual and collaborative performance. Delaware's only residential oncology camp for kids, Kay's Kamp, was held at SAS in August, providing an inspiring and uplifting conclusion to summer programs on campus. The School also hosts an educational day camp on environmental stewardship and sustainability for 8-12 year olds. The School is also host to a number of

Diocesan committee meetings throughout the year, and appreciates the opportunities it has to actively engage in and support the work and mission of the Church in Delaware.

The full-time teaching and administrative faculty consists of 36 men and 29 women; in addition the School has several part-time instructors, coaches, and nurses. The total support staff working in maintenance and housekeeping is 28. The clerical staff consists of 14 people. Including day care providers, security staff and instructional support staff, the total number of full and part-time employees equals 171. St. Andrew's is an equal opportunity employer.

### **ST. ANNE'S EPISCOPAL SCHOOL**

St. Anne's Episcopal School is located on the outskirts of Middletown, Delaware. Guided by the mission to prepare students for secondary education and lifelong learning, the pre-kindergarten through eighth grade school has grown from a student population of 180 to more than 315 in 9 years. St. Anne's mission is to enhance the intellectual, spiritual, physical, social and artistic growth of its students so that they may realize their potential for good as citizens of local and world communities. St. Anne's received its accreditation from the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools in November 2006. Most teachers have a master's degree or state certification, and all faculty and administrators have an obvious love for students.

The spiritual aspect of the school is woven through the curriculum with daily devotions, religion classes, and weekly chapel. Chapel services focus on how to love and follow God in prayer and action. "Singing, praying and reflecting together builds our sense of community and our belief that we are each created and guided by God," said the Rev. Louise Howlett, Chaplain at St. Anne's. "Each grade level also engages in curricular-connected service learning. Community service has flowed from the school's spiritual tenets of respect, responsibility, and compassion with annual food and clothing drives, and other outreach projects to help those less fortunate and to help preserve the environment." This past summer Jo Harney, former music teacher and choral director, took the Head of School position at an Episcopal preschool in Greenville, DE. Lauren Cataldi has stepped in to lead the choral program and Lower School music classes.

After school activities include class overnights, interscholastic sports, Math League, Odyssey of the Mind and Lego League as well as other enrichment and intramural experiences. Every student in the school sings or plays an instrument in the school concerts or helps reenact the nativity story on stage at Christmas.

The following are some facts to know about St. Anne's:

- We have a 7:1 student/teacher ratio and class average of 16 with lead and associate teachers for PreK – grade 4.
- We host weekly chapel services.
- We gave more than \$530,000 in financial aid grants to qualifying families in 2010-11.
- 58% of Middle School students qualified for the Johns Hopkins Scholars Program; based on CTY percentile scores of 95% or better.
- We employ full time Math and Literacy Specialists.
- Each week, students at every grade have classes in Art, Music, Computer, Spanish, Religion, Science, Library and Physical Education.
- We are located on a 125-acre rural campus that includes an outdoor chapel and an outdoor classroom.
- We offer extended care available before school at 7 AM and after school until 6 PM.

- We are members of the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS), the National Association of Episcopal Schools (NAES), and the Association of Delaware Valley Independent Schools (ADVIS).

Applications are still being accepted for most grades. Financial assistance is available to families who qualify. This year a third of the students at St. Anne's received some form of financial aid. A financial aid fund, called the Absalom Jones Financial Aid Endowment Fund, named in honor of the first African-American Episcopal minister, Absalom Jones, provides financial aid for those families of diverse backgrounds who qualify on basis of need.

The school also has several fund-raising projects in place to support the Absalom Jones Financial Aid Endowment Fund and the school's Annual Fund, which supports a wide variety of projects at the school, including teachers' salaries, financial aid, and technology.

### **ST. MICHAEL'S SCHOOL AND NURSERY, INC.**

**Our History** - St. Michael's School and Nursery is Delaware's oldest early childhood program and one of the oldest in the nation. St. Michael's was founded in 1890 by Alexis I. du Pont Coleman, son of the second Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Delaware and grandson of Alexis I. du Pont and was originally part of St. Michael's Episcopal Mission near Front and Adams Street on Wilmington's west side. In our early years we were a haven for children whose parents worked in local tanneries offering a safe, nurturing environment for children who were otherwise left unattended to fend for themselves all day on nearby vacant lots. We also operated a babies' hospital and the Episcopal archives contain stories about children who were left on doorsteps and were cared for at St. Michael's until we could find adoptive homes for them. We accepted children of all races and religions when public agencies would not. Always an innovator, full-day kindergarten was added to the nursery by 1908. Today,

St. Michael's remains a non-profit early education facility serving the full spectrum of diversity in our community including the most challenging – economic diversity. St. Michael's has evolved from being primarily a custodial childcare agency, to a premier school for early childhood education and is the recipient of the Governor's Award for Excellence in Early Care & Education.

**Our Mission** - St. Michael's School and Nursery is committed to the growth and support of children's development in mind, body, character and spirit. We provide exemplary and affordable early education and childcare in a nurturing atmosphere. St. Michael's welcomes all children.

"St. Michael's welcomes all children". This definitive and powerful sentence in our mission statement urges us to keep our doors open to the neediest children in our community. This year, St. Michael's will raise over \$700,000 to provide financial aid for underserved children. Diversity and accessibility go hand-in-hand at St. Michael's. Diversity is a broad term encompassing many elements. Economic, racial, religious, ethnic, family composition, parental education and employment levels are all factors that we consider to help us reach a true representation of our community. We provide important elements which may be rare or missing in the homes of many children in struggling families. By broadening children's life experiences and exposing them to many new opportunities, we help build a strong foundation for school readiness and success in life.

Our mission calls us to reach out to these children. Our vision sees a future where no achievement gap exists for any child and our determination leads us to keep our school of the

highest quality and accessible to *all* children.

**Our Impact on the Future** - For 120 years, St. Michael's has led the way in investing where in matters the most. Bringing people together to provide what is best for our little children has always been the St. Michael's way. Children in schools like St. Michael's generally attain a higher level of education, become financially independent and own their own homes. Our children get the learning foundation and the work ethic that lead them to become productive and contributing citizens.

### **STANDING COMMITTEE**

Established in 1785 when the Episcopal Church was founded, the Standing Committee serves as a council of advice and consent to the Bishop. Together with the Bishop, the Standing Committee makes decisions about the ministry and discipline of the diocese and the larger church. This includes advising the Bishop, becoming the ecclesiastical authority in the absence of the Bishop, making recommendations about candidates for holy orders, participating in the discipline of clergy in other dioceses, consenting to the elections of bishops in other dioceses, considering approvals for clergy who are beyond retirement age (72) who seek employment, and consenting to the sale or mortgaging of parochial property. Unique to Delaware, we also are actively involved with congregations in transition and have a role in transition ministry. The Standing Committee is required by the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church to discuss and vote upon requests for the election of bishops throughout the Church.

The Standing Committee approves the use of the endowment Memorial House.

The Committee meets monthly except for July and August. Members participate in Safe Church training and Anti-Racism training as required. We also meet yearly with other diocesan bodies to discuss matters of common concern affecting the life and health of the diocese. Both lay and clerical members of the diocese serve on the Standing Committee. ### **THE WAY HOME**

The Way Home continues to meet men and women at the prison gates and walk with them as they face the many challenges of returning to community after time spent in prison. This year, our twelfth year of service to prisoners and to those leaving the prison gates, is a very special year. One of the men who belonged to the Breaking into Prison Bible Study since 1997 has been granted parole, after serving 23 years. He is now in Work Release and is actively engaged with our program. He spoke at St. Martha's on Way Home Sunday, October 31<sup>st</sup>, 2010, and touched many hearts by his testimony. The day was like coming full circle for so many of us who have been praying for him, going before the Parole Board with him, and suffering with him through each prior rejection. After the service, we went out to the brick walk that encircles the church. There, we found the single names of prison Bible Study members. Most are released by now, but not all. None are forgotten. Now, he is on the way home – to a life of freedom and possibility. He stands before us as a clear example of how, with God's help, people can change.

The "Breaking into Prison" Bible Study, which began in 1997, continues to inspire, nourish, and challenge both inmate participants and community volunteers at the Sussex

Correctional Institution, (S.C.I.), in Georgetown. Every third Thursday is an eagerly - awaited day for all Bible Study participants! Ecumenical teams made up of an inmate and a community volunteer prepare and present the monthly sessions together.

The Way Home continues to offer a minimum of three years of post-release case management to program participants. Referrals come from a wide variety of sources – from prison counselors, Chaplains, program participants, family members, and from community members at large. While the majority of our work is with the prison in Georgetown, we also receive letters and requests for help from *all* of the Delaware prisons, as well as from prisons in our neighboring states. We present our program to each Pre-Release Class at S.C.I., and now on a rotating basis with three other prisons, and meet with inmates individually prior to their release. On release day, we are at the gate, and our journey together toward healing, crime-free life, stability, and renewal begins. The journey is different for each and every person, although there are many recurrent themes. Our work includes finding a bed in the community, providing for initial food and clothing needs, providing transportation to probation, job search, medical and counseling appointments, recovery and support group meetings, and working with our participants on their training and educational goals. Most importantly, our work is girded with emotional and spiritual support that is so sorely needed as a person makes this life-changing transition. Community mentors join us, giving of their time to help another in need. Each quarter, we host a covered dish dinner and celebrate with the Participant of the Quarter, affirming those who are doing a good job in their transition from prison to home, and sharing a time of fellowship, along with a great meal. Please join us at these special gatherings!

Some of our regular offerings include:

- ❖ Weekly Drug & Alcohol Awareness Class at Booker Street Church, Georgetown
- ❖ Monthly “Bridges to the Future” support group meetings for ex-offenders at Georgetown Presbyterian Church
- ❖ Way Home Women’s Group – offered at Georgetown Presbyterian Church
- ❖ Mentoring
- ❖ Weekly House meetings at The Way Home Men’s Transitional House
- ❖ Goals reviews for participants
- ❖ Celebrations for birthday and sobriety milestones
- ❖ Quarterly Dinners – in December, March, June, and September from 6:30 – 8:30 p.m. at the Georgetown Presbyterian Church on North Bedford Street.

Our program is making an impact. In terms of human potential, healing of broken relationships, and public safety, our work pays huge dividends in the lives of the community. Our work makes solid economic sense as well. It costs The Way Home approximately \$5,000 to provide case management support for one participant per year, as compared to the approximately \$35,000 annually that it costs to keep one person in prison. Recidivism rates for Way Home participants are twice as low as for those who receive no post-release support.

The lives of those we serve are being enriched in so many wonderful ways. We have been working with a young man who served 16 years in prison. Today he is active in his church, gainfully employed, buying his own home, and helping out in every way that he can. He too was a participant in the Breaking into Prison Bible Study. You will see his story featured in our Friends of The Way Home Summer 2010 Newsletter. He has made a huge life change. This is only one of countless stories of renewal.

We are working to continue our statistical research with the help of the University of Delaware, which will result in a ten year study on recidivism. We are looking forward to this

report, and will share it with you when it becomes available.

2009 – 2010 marked the beginning of a statewide initiative put into action by Governor Markell, to coordinate services for prisoners *before* they are released. There is public recognition of the problems, the inhumanity, and the inefficiency of releasing people who have no support networks in place. Tony Neal and I have been appointed to serve on the Sussex County I-ADAPTS team. We work with the community and the heads of key state departments to see that the needs of ex-offenders who are returning to Sussex County are addressed as efficiently and compassionately as possible. This represents a sea change in state government and in the Department of Corrections, and it fills us with hope for a better future.

We believe in the Gospel mandate to seek and serve Christ in all others, including prisoners, ex-offenders, and victims of crime. We also believe that when time is served and a person is released, punishment should end, and that person should be offered another chance. Who among us hasn't received many second chances from friends, family members, teachers, and mentors?

Now, please take a few moments to put yourselves in the place of someone being released from prison with little to no support, no place to go, no identification, no money, no driver's license, and, perhaps, not even weather- appropriate clothing. What would you do? Where would you turn? These are the kinds of crossroads where *we* come in, offering alternatives to the life of crime and dysfunction that led to imprisonment in the first place. As Tony Neal says, "The Way Home is a life-saving station." Please pray for all of us as we navigate the crossroads and byways of this journey.

#### TRUSTEES

The Trustees of the Diocese of Delaware met together seven times during 2010 to discharge their responsibilities for proper distribution of discretionary and non-discretionary distributions from the trust funds of the Diocese, and for supervision of the investment of funds entrusted to them by bequests and gifts or by churches and church-affiliated organizations.

Most of the trust funds, both of the congregations and of the Diocese, are jointly invested in a common fund called Master Fund A. Please see the report on the Investment Committee in the preceding pages. In 2010, \$328,667 generated by the trust funds of the diocese was applied to the Diocesan Council budget toward the expenses of the Episcopal Function (which consists of salaries and benefits of the Bishop), clergy training and care, The Good Shepherd Church Plant, support for Diocesan Mission and for growing congregations of the diocese.

A total of \$125,474 was paid to the Diocesan Council toward the expenses incurred by the Diocesan Office and Property staff for Trustees' work.

In addition to the sums distributed to the Diocesan Council, the Trustees disbursed \$256,016 including distribution from designated funds (subject to year-end audit) for the following purposes:

- Support of conference participation and continuing education
- Housing and travel expenses for the Bishop and Mrs. Wright
- Financial support for the health plan costs for retired clergy and lay and their spouses
- Financial aid to needy clergy, retired clergy, and surviving clergy spouses
- The missions of the Diocese for music
- Support for the Cathedral Choir School of Delaware
- Special diocesan projects and discretionary needs
- Support for activities for clergy, wardens, and their spouses
- Aid to the seminarians
- Repairs and Maintenance for diocesan owned properties

At the 225<sup>th</sup> Convention, Mr. Thomas Sombar was elected by unanimous vote to a six-year term.

Independent Auditor's Report

To the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church

We have audited the accompanying statements of assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware (the "Trustees") as of December 31, 2010 and 2009 and the related statements of support, revenue, expenses and changes in fund balances for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Trustees' management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note A, the Trustees' policy is to prepare their financial statements in accordance with the provisions of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Those provisions require that buildings, improvements, and equipment be depreciated. They also require that a statement of cash flows be prepared at least annually. The Trustees have elected not to provide for depreciation and not to prepare a statement of cash flows. The effects of these departures on the Trustees' financial position have not been determined.

In our opinion, except for the effect of not depreciating fixed assets and not preparing a statement of cash flows as discussed in the previous paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware as of December 31, 2010 and 2009, and the support, revenue, expenses, and changes in fund balances for the years then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note A.

***NOTE A – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES***

The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware is a not-for-profit Corporation of the State of Delaware. The purpose of the Organization is to advance the religious and educational work of the Episcopal Church by serving as the custodian and trustee of the property and funds and as the fiscal agent of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware and by providing financial, custodial, trust, and investment services and advice for the Diocese and all of its institutions and by fulfilling such duties as are authorized and required by the Convention of the Diocese and to aid, support, and maintain the Bishop of the Diocese, ministers and missionaries of the Episcopal Church and to further religious, charitable, benevolent, and educational objects generally, and in furtherance of said objects to minister and serve the needs of the young, the aged, the sick, the disabled, and the poor, and to improve the spiritual, physical, mental, and moral condition of humanity.

**1. Method of Accounting**

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the provisions of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church. These practices differ in certain respects, which may be material, from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The significant differences from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America are as follows:

- a. The Organization does not record contributions in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Made and Contributions Received" (FASB ASC 958-605). ASC 958-605 requires that the Organization record contributions received as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Contributions are recorded on the cash basis.
- b. The Organization does not prepare its financial statements in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations" (FASB ASC 958-205). ASC 958-205 requires that the Organization report information regarding financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted net assets.

Although required by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, the Trustees have elected not to record depreciation on capital purchases and not to present a statement of cash flows. The Trustees do not feel that the lack of depreciation and the statement of cash flows cause the statements presented to be misleading, nor do they believe the omitted information is meaningful. The effect of not depreciating fixed assets and omitting a statement of cash flows has not been determined.

**2. Fund Accounting**

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Diocese, the accounts of the Organization are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group. Fund groups are composed of the following:

**a. The Advance and Development Fund**

The Advance Fund represents resources available to provide loans to the churches and institutions of the Episcopal Diocese of Delaware. The amounts of the loans and the terms of repayment are determined by the Board on an individual case basis. Effective January 1, 1977, the Board determined that all Advance Fund excess income and expenses would be allocated to the Development Fund.

The Development Fund represents resources available to provide grants to the churches and institutions of the Episcopal Diocese of Delaware. The Board approves the amounts and terms of the grants.

**b. The Trustees' Funds**

The Trustees' Funds are consolidated and include the following funds:

The Administrative Expense Fund represents funds to cover administrative expenses for the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware.

The Ash Fund represents funds to promote the Gospel of Christ and extend the worship of the Episcopal Church of Delaware.

The Bishop's Missionary Fund represents funds to provide the Bishop with money for general missionary work.

The Bishopstead Maintenance Fund represents funds for the maintenance and operation of the home and guesthouse of the Bishop.

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***NOTE A – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT  
ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)***

**b. The Trustees' Funds (Continued)**

The Buckelew Trust Fund represents funds to be used at the discretion of the Bishop and the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware.

The Calvary-Herndon Fund for Urban Ministries represents assets transferred, at book value, to the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware by the Convention of the Diocese of Delaware on April 25, 1992 following the termination of parish status of Calvary Church. All real property was sold in 1994.

The Clergy Aid Funds represent funds to satisfy the needs of retired or disabled clergy or their widows and clergy's wives and families in times of financial stress.

The Ellason and Molly Laird Downs Real Estate Maintenance Fund represents funds to be used by the Episcopal Diocese of Delaware for the maintenance of Diocesan owned properties.

The Episcopate Endowment Fund represents funds for the Bishop's salary, expenses, and allowances.

The General Diocesan Fund represents funds to be used for Church purposes at the discretion of the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware.

The General Diocesan Episcopate Transition Fund represents funds that have been set aside and reinvested. These funds will be used to assist in the transition costs for the eleventh Bishop of the Diocese of Delaware.

The Oberod Fund was started in 2006 and represents distributions from the Estate of Mrs. DuPont Lunger and from the sale of the Oberod Conference and Retreat Center. The use of these funds are at the discretion of the Bishop and Trustees of the Diocese.

The Silliman Fund represents funds to meet extraordinary expenses for clergy and other worthy persons in The Diocese as needed.

The Tatnall Fund represents funds to be used at the Bishop's discretion for theological education, clergy aid, and missionary work.

The Theological Education Fund represents funds for the benefit of theological students.

The Williams Missionary Fund represents funds created under the will of Elizabeth Williams and provides for the income to be distributed as follows: two-thirds to The Diocesan Council, Inc. to

be distributed to missionary churches and one-third directly to the choirs of the missionary churches.

The Property Fund represents funds expended for land and buildings.

**3. Security Transactions and Related Investment Income**

Security transactions are recorded on the trade date. Investments owned are carried at market value. The difference between cost and market value is reflected as unrealized appreciation (depreciation) on investments. Realized gains (losses) from security transactions are determined for financial reporting purposes on the basis of first-in, first-out. Dividend income is recognized on the ex-dividend date and interest income is recognized on an accrual basis.

**4. Income Taxes**

The Trustees is a not-for-profit entity that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Trustees is not a private foundation.

**5. Accounts Receivable**

Accounts receivable are recorded at net realizable value. The Trustees use the specific charge off method to account for bad debts. Management feels that this does not differ materially from the allowance method. There were no bad debts during 2010 and 2009.

**6. Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

**7. Subsequent Events**

The Trustees has evaluated subsequent events through June 22, 2011, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. As further discussed in Note B, Council sold the Good Shepherd Rectory property in March 2011 and used the net proceeds to pay down the loan and grant payable to the Trustees.

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**NOTE B – LOANS/MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE**

Loans receivable bear interest at rates ranging from 2.0% to 5.8% (rate based on specific circumstances of borrower but not to exceed 80% of the true interest rate on twenty year U.S. Government bonds). Interest is payable semi-annually. Loan principal is amortized on a straight-line basis with terms up to twenty years, some with five-year balloon payments. Interest income is recognized over time as it is earned. Loans/Mortgages receivable at December 31 were as follows:

In addition to the Good Shepherd loan receivable, a grant receivable of \$168,000 from the Diocesan Council, Inc. (the "Council") was outstanding as of December 31, 2010 and 2009 for the purchase of a building and land in Bear, Delaware.

In March 2011, Council sold this property and paid the Trustees \$216,273, the net proceeds received from the sale of the property. The net proceeds were first used to repay the balance of the loan as of March 2011; net proceeds available after paying down the loan were used to begin to pay down the grant to the Trustees. After the sale of the property, \$43,127 remained due to the Trustees for the grant. The balance of the grant is expected to be received at \$700 per month until the grant receivable has fully been satisfied.

**NOTE D – INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)**

Master Fund A units are composed of shares in a fund owned collectively with other entities with affiliation to the Episcopal Church. The Fund itself is composed of various publicly traded debt and equity securities. The Trustees oversee the function of Master Fund A for all Fund unit holders. Units may be liquidated by unit holders on demand without restriction. The market value represents the Trustees' pro-rata share of the combined fair market value of the net assets of Master Fund A.

**NOTE E – LOAN PAYABLE** In 2007, the Trustees were provided a \$700,000 loan for its purchase of 29 West Park Place in Newark. Payments of interest only are made monthly until maturity and the principal on the loan is due in full at maturity in April 1, 2012 and is secured by the Newark property. The loan bears a variable interest rate of the National Commercial Rate less 25 basis points. The interest rate on December 31, 2010 and 2009 was 3.75% and 3.75%, respectively. Interest expense of \$26,615 and \$26,615 was reported in the accompanying financial statements for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

**NOTE F – FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS**

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Trustees to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of investments. Concentrations of credit risk with respect to investments are limited due to the placement of its investments with professional investment advisors subject to the Trustees' investment policies.

The Trustees maintain operating cash balances in different financial institutions. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insures these balances up to \$250,000. In the normal course of business, the cash balances may exceed this amount. The Trustees consider the possibility of incurring a loss remote.

**NOTE G – CONTRIBUTED SERVICES**

Many volunteers contribute their time to further the goals of the Trustees. While significant, the value of these services is not readily determinable and no amounts have been recorded as revenue to recognize them for financial statement purposes.

**NOTE A – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING  
POLICIES**

**1. Nature of Activities**

Master Fund “A” (the “Fund”), is an investment account for the various organizations, institutions, churches and other agencies in affiliation with The Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware. Each organization, institution, or church may own units in the Master Fund “A”. The Fund itself is maintained by SunTrust Bank as custodian under the direction of and with policy set by the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware through its investment committee.

**2. Method of Accounting**

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the provisions of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, except that no statement of cash flows has been presented as required. The Trustees do not believe this information is meaningful to users of these statements. These practices differ in certain respects, which may be material, from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

**3. Investments in Marketable Securities**

Security transactions are recorded on the settlement date basis, which is not materially different from the trade date basis. Investments owned are carried at market value, which is the closing bid price on the last day of trading during the period. The difference between cost and market value is reflected as unrealized appreciation (depreciation) on investments. Realized gains (losses) from security transactions are determined for financial reporting purposes on the basis of first-in, first-out. Dividend income is recognized on the ex-dividend date and interest income is recognized on an accrual basis.

Although not required by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, the Fund has elected to include the disclosure requirements of Financial Accounting Standards Board (“FASB”) SFAS No. 157 (FASB ASC 820-10), which provides enhanced guidance for using fair value to measure assets and liabilities. FASB ASC 820-10 establishes a fair value hierarchy and specifies that a valuation technique used to measure fair value shall maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The objective of a fair value measurement is to determine the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (an exit price). Accordingly, the fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3).

**3. Investments in Marketable Securities (Continued)**

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820-10 are described below:

**Level 1** – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities;

**Level 2** – Quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly;

**Level 3** – Prices or valuations that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and unobservable.

**4. Premiums and Discounts**

The difference between the cost and the face value of debt instruments purchased (premiums or discounts) is amortized or accreted over the life of the investment on a straight line or effective yield basis.

There were total net premiums paid of \$637,333 and \$922,327 and net discounts of \$19,663 and \$7,483 received, as of December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively, representing the maturity value of fixed income securities over cost (discount) or cost over maturity value (premium).

Amortization expense recognized on bond premiums was \$150,242 during the year ended December 31, 2010. Because the original purchase of the premiums on some of the bonds occurred in November and December 2009, bond premiums were not amortized for these months, since the effect of not amortizing these premiums over the life of the security was not material to the financial statements in 2009. In 2010, the amortizations of the premiums on bonds for these two months were included in 2010 bond amortization expense. This effect was not material to the financial statements.

**5. Transactions with Unit-holders**

Purchase or redemption of units may be made monthly by unit-holders and are based on the previous month's net asset value. The Fund makes regular quarterly distributions to unit-holders on March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31. During 2010 and 2009, standard gross quarterly distributions were 44.5 and 46 cents per unit, respectively. Participants may elect to increase or decrease this distribution, which will result in liquidation or addition of units.

**6. Amounts Held on Behalf of Participants**

As a convenience to Participants, the Fund will hold cash balances on their behalf in segregated accounts separate from their Fund share balances. These cash balances are redeemable on demand. The total of all these segregated accounts was \$893,801 and \$991,077 at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively. These amounts appear as liabilities on the statement of assets, liabilities and net assets.

**7. Administrative and Investment Fees**

Fees are paid to the Trustees of the Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware (the "Trustees") and Hamilton & Company to cover investment advisory and administrative services provided to the Fund. Fees to the investment advisors and custodians are paid based on the following annual rates calculated on the average market value of assets under management:

Hamilton & Company receives an annual flat fee of \$40,000, allows a credit for commissions received and bills separately for out-of-pocket expenses. During 2010 and 2009, the Trustees were paid \$18,701 and \$18,782, respectively, and Hamilton & Company was paid \$54,999 and \$33,608, respectively. For the years ending December 31, 2010 and 2009, John Hsu Capital Group, Inc. was paid \$0 and \$58,078, respectively, Dawson Capital Management was paid or due \$160,610 and \$145,956, respectively, Neuberger Berman was paid or due \$111,898 and \$73,221, respectively, SunTrust Bank was paid or due \$61,232 and \$55,716, respectively, Steinberg Asset Management was paid or due \$89,267 and \$77,664, respectively, and Payden & Rygel was paid or due \$50,328 and \$0, respectively.

**8. Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

**9. Concentration of Market Risk**

The Fund maintains its cash balances with nationally known and established financial institutions. From time to time, in the normal course of business, the Fund's cash balances may exceed federally insured limits. Management believes the risk of loss is remote.

**10. Subsequent Events**

Management has evaluated subsequent events through June 22, 2011, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

**NOTE B – FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS**

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Fund to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of investments. Concentrations of credit risk with respect to investments are limited due to the placement of its investments with professional investment advisors subject to the Fund's investment policies.

**NOTE C – INCOME TAXES**

The Fund is not subject to federal or state income taxes. All income is passed-through directly to the owners of units. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been recorded in the accompanying financial statements.

The Fund has determined the fair value of certain assets through application of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 157, *Fair Value Measurement* (FASB ASC 820-10). As required by FASB ASC 820-10, investments are classified within the level of the lowest significant input considered in determining fair value. In evaluating the level at which the Fund's investments have been classified, management has assessed factors including, but not limited to, price transparency, subscription activity, redemption activity and the existence or absence of certain restrictions. Financial assets valued using Level 1 inputs are based on unadjusted quoted market prices within active markets. Financial assets valued using Level 2 inputs are based on quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly. Financial assets valued using Level 3 inputs are based on assumptions and pricing models and other unobservable inputs.

We have audited the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Diocesan Council, Inc. (the "Council") as of December 31, 2010 and, the related statement of support, revenue, expenses and changes in fund balances for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Council's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. The prior year summarized comparative information has been derived from the Council's December 31, 2009 financial statements and, accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Council's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2009, from which the summarized information was derived.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note A, the Council's policy is to prepare its financial statements in accordance with the provisions of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Those provisions require that buildings, improvements, and equipment be depreciated. They also require that a statement of cash flows be prepared at least annually. The Council has elected not to provide for depreciation and not to prepare a statement of cash flows. The effects of these departures on the Council's financial position have not been determined.

In our opinion, except for the effect of not depreciating fixed assets and not preparing a statement of cash flows as discussed in the previous paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Diocesan Council, Inc. as of December 31, 2010, and the support, revenue, expenses, and changes in fund balances for the years then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note A.

**NOTE A – LINE OF BUSINESS AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING  
POLICIES**

The Diocesan Council, Inc. (the “Council”) is a not-for-profit organization incorporated in the State of Delaware. The purpose of the Council is to have charge of the unification, development and prosecution of the missionary work, church extension, religious education, and Christian social service of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware, and such other matters as may be committed to it by the Convention of the Diocese.

**1. Method of Accounting**

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the provisions of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church. These practices differ in certain respects, which may be material, from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The significant differences from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America are as follows:

- a. The Council does not record contributions in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 116, “Accounting for Contributions Made and Contributions Received” (FASB ASC 958-605). ASC 958-605 requires that the Organization record contributions received as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Contributions are recorded on the cash basis.
- b. The Council does not prepare its financial statements in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 117, “Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations” (FASB ASC 958-205). ASC 958-205 requires that the Organization report information regarding financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted net assets.

Although required by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, the Council has elected not to record depreciation on capital purchases and not to present a statement of cash flows. The Council does not feel that the lack of depreciation and the statement of cash flows cause the statements presented to be misleading, nor do they believe the omitted information is meaningful. The effect of not depreciating fixed assets and omitting a statement of cash flows has not been determined.

**2. Fund Accounting**

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Council, the accounts of the Council are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

The Operating Fund represents the portion of expendable funds that are available for the support of the Council's general operations and approved by Diocesan Convention.

The Special Fund represents funds reserved for specific ministries.

The Property Fund represents funds restricted for property acquisitions.

The Bishop's Discretionary Fund is utilized to account for special projects conducted by the Bishop.

Memorial House is the Diocesan Conference Center located in Rehoboth Beach, Delaware.

Camp Arrowhead is a 145-acre summer camp and conference center on Rehoboth Bay, Delaware.

**3. Security Transactions and Related Investment Income**

Security transactions are recorded on the trade date. Investments owned are carried at market value. The difference between cost and market value is reflected as unrealized appreciation (depreciation) on investments. Realized gains (losses) from security transactions are determined for financial reporting purposes on the basis of first-in, first-out. Dividend income is recognized on the ex-dividend date, and interest income is recognized on the accrual basis.

**4. Income Taxes**

The Council is a not-for-profit entity that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Council is not a private foundation.

**5. Accounts and Acceptances Receivable**

Accounts and acceptances receivable are recorded at net realizable value. The Council uses the specific charge off method to account for bad debts. Management feels that this does not differ materially from the allowance method. There were no bad debts during 2010 and 2009.

**6. Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

**7. Prior Year Financial Statements**

The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total but not by fund. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with the provisions of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Council's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2009, from which the summarized information was derived.

**8. Subsequent Events**

Council has evaluated subsequent events through June 22, 2011, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. As further discussed in Note E, Council sold the Good Shepherd Rectory property in March 2011 and used the net proceeds to pay down the loan and grant payable to the Trustees.

Master Fund A units are composed of shares in a fund owned collectively with other entities with affiliation to the Episcopal Church. The Fund itself is composed of various publicly traded debt and equity securities. The Trustees oversee the function of Master Fund A for all Fund unit holders. Units may be liquidated by unit holders on demand without restriction. The market value represents the Trustees' pro-rata share of the combined fair market value of the net assets of Master Fund A.

**NOTE C – PENSION PLAN**

The lay employees and the clergy of the Diocesan Council, Inc. are participants in separate pension plans. The Episcopal Church Lay Employees Retirement Plan covers the lay employees and the Church Pension Fund covers the clergy. Both plans are defined benefit plans. Lay employees are eligible for participation upon completion of one year or 1,000 hours of service. Employer contributions to the plan are funded based on 9% of the participants' compensation. The plan provides for full vesting after five years of service. Clergy are eligible for participation and are fully-vested immediately, and contributions are funded based on 18% of the participants' compensation. Pension plan contributions were \$79,982 and \$79,837 for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009 respectively.

**NOTE E – LOANS AND GRANT PAYABLE**

In addition to the Good Shepherd loan payable, a grant payable of \$168,000 to the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Delaware (the "Trustees") was outstanding as of December 31, 2010 and 2009 for the purchase of a building and land in Bear, Delaware. The grant is expected to be paid to the Trustees upon Good Shepherd attaining church status, thus becoming a separate entity from the Diocesan Council, Inc.

In March 2011, Council sold this property and paid the Trustees \$216,273, the net proceeds received from the sale of the property. The net proceeds were first used to repay the balance of the loan as of March 2011; net proceeds available after paying down the loan were used to begin to pay down the grant to the Trustees. After the sale of the property, \$43,127 remained due to the Trustees for the grant. The balance of the grant is expected to be paid at \$700 per month until the grant payable has fully been satisfied.

**NOTE F – FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS**

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Council to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of investments. Concentrations of credit risk with respect to investments are limited due to the placement of its investments with professional investment advisors subjected to the Council's investment policies.

The Diocesan Council, Inc. maintains operating cash balances in different financial institutions. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insures these balances up to \$250,000. In the normal course of business, balances exceed this amount. The Council considers the possibility of incurring a loss remote.

**NOTE G – POST-RETIREMENT BENEFITS OTHER THAN PENSION**

The Council provides post-retirement medical coverage for retired clergy and their spouses and lay employees over age 65 or before age 65 if disabled. The coverage is supplemental to Medicare Parts A and B.

This policy of providing such benefits is subject to change, at any time, in accordance with Canon 23 of the Diocese of Delaware. This policy is currently under study by the Trustees and Diocesan Council.

Based on the existing policy adopted by the Diocesan Council, in accordance with Canon 23 of the Diocese of Delaware, the Council's accumulated post-retirement benefit obligation (APBO) for current retirees and spouses as of December 31, 2010 and 2009 was estimated at \$814,746 and \$628,141, respectively. The weighted average discount rate used in the calculation of the APBO was 7.0%. The healthcare cost gross trend rates assume a 5% rate of increase for 2010 and 2009. If the health care cost trend rates were increased by 1% for each year, the accumulated post-retirement benefit obligation as of December 31, 2010 and 2009 would increase by \$29,456 and \$19,520, respectively. The Council's post-retirement benefit obligation is not funded. The amounts of accumulated benefit obligation of \$814,746 and \$628,141, and the amounts of the 1% increase in health care costs of \$29,456 and \$19,520 set forth herein are based on the assumption that the existing policy to provide such benefits is not changed by the Diocesan Council. The existing policy was adopted by the Council as an extraordinary benefit and not as an entitlement under contract.

The accumulated post-retirement benefit obligation for medical benefits for clergy, lay employees and their respective spouses who could be eligible and receive this benefit in the future cannot be reasonably estimated; accordingly, no liability has been accrued by management in these financial statements.

**NOTE H – PRIOR YEAR ADJUSTMENT**

The Council's financial statements as of December 31, 2009 were restated to correct an error in recording fixed assets additions for vehicles purchased in a prior year. Unrestricted net assets as of January 1, 2009 was been increased by \$3,815 to correct the error. In addition, equipment as of January 1, 2009 increased by \$3,815 to correct this error.

## Bishops of Delaware

### **ALFRED LEE (38)**

First Bishop of Delaware. Elected May 26, 1841, in the 56th year of the Diocese, at the Convention held in St. Paul's Church, Georgetown. Consecrated October 12, 1841, at St. Paul's Chapel, New York City. Rector of St. Andrew's Church, Wilmington, from 1843 to 1887 and Presiding Bishop from 1884 to 1887. Died April 12, 1887 at the age of 79.

### **LEIGHTON COLEMAN (146)**

Elected Bishop of Delaware in the 103rd year of the Diocese at the Convention held in Christ Church, Dover, June 3, 1888. Consecrated October 18, 1888 in St. John's Church, Wilmington. Died December 1, 1907 at the age of 70.

### **FREDERICK JOSEPH KINSMAN (239)**

Elected Bishop of Delaware in the 123rd year of the Diocese at the Convention in Trinity Church, Wilmington on June 3, 1908. Consecrated October 28, 1908 in Trinity Church, Wilmington. Bishop Kinsman submitted his resignation to the Convention of 1919, the resignation being accepted by the House of Bishops in October 1919. Died in July 1944 at the age of 75.

### **PHILIP COOK (311)**

Elected Bishop of Delaware in the 135th year of the Diocese at the Convention held in Immanuel Church, Wilmington on May 12, 1920. Consecrated October 14, 1920 in St. Michael's and All Angels' Church, Baltimore, Maryland. Died March 25, 1938 at the age of 62.

### **ARTHUR RAYMOND MCKINSTRY (414)**

Elected Bishop of Delaware in the 153rd year of the Diocese at a special Convention held in Immanuel Church, Wilmington on November 15, 1938. Consecrated February 17, 1939 in the Cathedral Church of St. John, Wilmington. Retired on December 31, 1954. Died December 25, 1991, at the age of 97.

### **JOHN BROOKE MOSLEY (526)**

Elected Bishop Coadjutor in the 168th year of the Diocese at a special Convention held in Immanuel Church, Wilmington on June 29, 1953. Consecrated October 28, 1953 in the Cathedral Church of St. John, Wilmington. Became Diocesan Bishop January 1, 1955. Installation service held January 16, 1955 in the Cathedral Church of St. John, Wilmington. Submitted resignation as Bishop of Delaware to the Presiding Bishop and to the Diocese to become effective October 1, 1968; the resignation being accepted by the House of Bishops. Served as Deputy for Overseas Relations to the Presiding Bishop for two years (October 1968 to October 1970), as President of Union Theological Seminary, New York City for four years (November 1970 to November 1974) and in mid-November of 1974 became Assistant Bishop, Diocese of Pennsylvania. Retired January 2, 1982. Died March 4, 1988 at the age of 72.

### **WILLIAM HENRY MEAD (628)**

Elected Bishop of Delaware in the 183rd year of the Diocese at a Special Convention held in All Saints' Church, Rehoboth Beach on June 28, 1968. Consecrated November 15, 1968 in Christ Our King Roman Catholic Church, Wilmington and installed that same day in the Cathedral Church of St. John, Wilmington. Died February 25, 1974 at the age of 53.

**WILLIAM HAWLEY CLARK (705)**

Elected Bishop of Delaware in the 190th year of the Diocese at the Annual Convention held in St. David's Church, Brandywine Hundred, Wilmington on January 24, 1975. Consecrated May 16, 1975 in Christ Our King Roman Catholic Church, Wilmington and installed May 18, 1975 in the Cathedral Church of St. John, Wilmington. Retired December 31, 1985. Died March 7, 1997 at the age of 77.

**QUINTIN EBENEZER PRIMO, JR. (683), INTERIM BISHOP**

Between the retirement of the Rt. Rev. William H. Clark and the consecration of the IX Bishop of Delaware, the Standing Committee of the Diocese invited the Rt. Rev. Quintin E. Primo, Jr., retired Suffragan Bishop of Chicago, to serve the Diocese of Delaware as Interim Bishop. Bishop Primo accepted this call and fulfilled this valuable ministry with grace and distinction. He died January 15, 1998 in Wilmington, Delaware.

**CALVIN CABELL TENNIS (816)**

Elected Bishop of Delaware in the 201st year of the Diocese at Part II of the 1986 Annual Convention, held at Grace Church, Brandywine Hundred, on June 14, 1986. Consecrated November 8, 1986 at St. Helena's Roman Catholic Church, Wilmington and installed November 9, 1986 at the Cathedral Church of St. John, Wilmington. He retired on December 31, 1997.

**WAYNE PARKER WRIGHT (941)**

Elected 10<sup>th</sup> Bishop of Delaware at Part II-B of the 212th Annual Convention, held at the Cathedral Church of St. John, Wilmington, on February 28, 1998. Consecrated June 20, 1998 in an outdoor service at St. Andrew's School in Middletown and installed June 21, 1998 at the Cathedral Church of St. John, Wilmington.
